WHEREAS, the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin is a federally recognized Indian government and a treaty tribe recognized by the laws of the United States, and

WHEREAS, the Oneida General Tribal Council is the governing body of the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin, and

WHEREAS the Oneida Business Committee has been delegated the authority of Article IV, Section 1 of the Oneida Tribal Constitution by the Oneida General Tribal Council, and

WHEREAS the Oneida Tribe seeks to honor our elders by fostering their independence, health and well being, and

IEREAS according to the 1995 Elder Survey, Oneida elders ranked health care and home care as their second highest priority concern, and

WHEREAS, there are currently 1,372 enrolled elders, of which 453 elders have disabilities and are in need of day care, home health and day health services.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin submits a grant application to the Department of Health and Human Services for an Elder Health Care Initiative Grant.
