RESOLUTION #<u>09-16-98-C</u> VandeWalle Phase II Resolution

WHEREAS, the Oneida Nation of Wisconsin is a federally recognized Indian government and a treaty tribe recognized by the laws of the United States, and

WHEREAS, the Oneida General Tribal Council is the governing body of the Oneida Nation of Wisconsin, and

WHEREAS, the Oneida Business Committee has been delegated the authority of Article IV, Section 1 of the Oneida Tribe Constitution by the Oneida General Council, and

WHEREAS, Congress by enactment of the Transportation Equity Act for the 21st Century (TEA-21) provided a mechanism for Indian Tribes to exercise the right of SELF-DETERMINATION; and

WHEREAS, the Oneida Nation tribal roads must be placed on the Bureau of Indian Affairs Reservation Roads System Inventory to qualify for Maintenance and Construction Dollars, and

WHEREAS, the Oneida Nation Department of Public Works is responsible for providing maintenance service to Tribal roads.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: that the Oneida Nation of Wisconsin intends to transfer road right-of-way for the VandeWalle Phase II housing project, part of Indian Claims 133, 130, 129, 128, and 118, and part of the northwest quarter of the southwest quarter of section 4, all being in the T23-R19E, Town of Oneida, Outagamie County, Wisconsin.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: that the Oneida Nation of Wisconsin grants a lifetime easement to the Bureau of Indian affairs for the above named right-of-way free of compensation.
