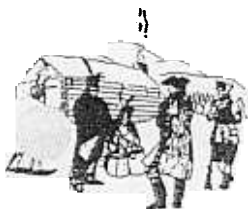


Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin

Resolution # 3-13-02-A Juvenile Accountability Incentive Block Grant

- WHEREAS, The Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin is a federally recognized Indian government and a Treaty Tribe recognized by the laws of the United States, and
- WHEREAS, the General Tribal Council is the governing body of the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin, and
- WHEREAS, the Oneida Business Committee has been delegated the authority of Article IV, Section of the Oneida Tribal Constitution by the Oneida General Tribal council, and
- WHEREAS, the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin has determined that the overall goal of the Oneida Nation is to protect, maintain and improve the standard of living and the environment in which the Oneida people live, and
- WHEREAS, the Oneida Tribe recognizes that there is a need to provide a safe environment for our youth and reducing the rate juvenile criminal occurrences, and
- WHEREAS, through a joint effort of the Oneida Police Department and the Oneida Nation School System juvenile criminal behavior will be identified and documented by acquiring technology necessary to assist in tracking of such behavior, and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin authorizes and submits a grant application to the State of Wisconsin/ Office of Justice Assistance for a Juvenile Accountability Incentive Block Grant (JAIBG) to acquire technology to document juvenile criminal behavior.
